



Keeping kids safe is everybody's responsibility, especially on our roadways, driveways and parking lots. Here are some helpful kid-friendly tips to make sure we all get where we're going, safely and on time:

Always Cross at the Crosswalk

Kids, it's never safe to cross in the middle of the street or between parked cars. Drivers—including those in big vehicles like garbage trucks—will have a difficult time seeing you and may not have enough time to react. When there isn't a marked crosswalk, everyone should cross at the corner. Make sure you always look both ways before crossing any street.

Stay on the Sidewalk

Trucks—especially garbage trucks take much longer to stop than cars. Play it safe and let a truck go past before crossing the street.

Watch for Right Turns

Kids, before stepping off the curb, look over your shoulder to make sure there isn't a vehicle behind you about to make a right turn directly into your path!

Pay Attention in Parking Lots

Parking lots, driveways and other "nontraffic" areas are just as dangerous as the streets. Garbage trucks that are backing up or servicing dumpsters, or any vehicle looking for a parking spot may not see you walking around them. So remember—never play in a parking lot!

Locally, we have 29 full-time employees, in addition to 24 collection vehicles, to keep services flowing smoothly for residential, commercial and industrial customers in the City of Lake Oswego. Republic's resources allow us to provide Lake Oswego with a variety of services that help meet the City's environmental goals, while still providing the quality service that has been trusted for many years.





Lake Oswego Bulky Waste Day

On June 8, 2013, Republic Services partnered with the City of Lake Oswego to collect bulky waste items from residents. The collection was held to assist Lake Oswegians dispose of items that would not fit in their regular garbage cart. 10.1 tons of bulky waste was collected that day. Over 43% of the items from the event were able to be recovered and recycled from the collection! These items included wood, metal, brick, concrete and E-Waste.

Plastic is everywhere and can be a confusing material to recycle properly. It's in our shoes, cups, phones, toys, desks, chairs, and even our clothes. The world of recycling is based on commodity markets, meaning there must be

a market for each material we recycle. Someone must be willing to use the material as feedstock to manufacture new products for these markets to sustain themselves. A shake up in the plastic markets, based mainly overseas, is causing concern. Some say the change is catastrophic, while others think it's the best thing to happen to recycling in years.

Resource Recycling explains, "Last February, China announced a 10-month enforcement campaign relating to the import of waste and recycling materials into the country. The enforcement of the tougher standards has hit mixed plastic bales, with containers either piling up at Chinese ports or being shipped back to the U.S. Mixed bales are ones where contaminants consist of

unacceptable levels of metal, paper, organic material, other non-plastic materials, or other plastic resins. What does this mean for domestic markets? Some think this change may stimulate U.S. markets and help make

Republic Services collects plastic jugs, tubs, bottles, and jars in your recycling cart. the domestic market more competitive with foreign buyers. Others argue that domestic material recovery facilities (MRFs) have not invested in technology required to effectively sort the material."

Curbside commingle collection of plastic containers has not changed. Republic

Services is still collecting plastic jugs, tubs, bottles, and jars in commingle carts. Part of the reason Republic Services has been hesitant to expand plastics collection is because of the instability of plastic markets. Please do not add other plastics to the cart besides jugs, tubs, bottles, and jars. This helps to minimize contamination and maintain recycling efficiency.
