Join us for a hands-on workshop to learn about bokashi composting. This event is perfect for beginners who want to start composting their food scraps in a simple and effective way. Master Gardener Maggie Kolk will guide you through the process step by step, so you can start reducing your waste and nourishing the soil.

Bokashi is a Japanese word that means fermented organic matter. The Bokashi composting method involves recycling food scraps and mixing them with a mixture of effective microorganisms, water, sugar, and wheat bran. It creates compost faster and can be done in smaller containers and even inside.

Don't miss this opportunity to make a positive impact on the environment while connecting with like-minded individuals.

Donate your gently used Halloween costumes and shop for new ones at Goodwill. Put that jack o' lantern pumpkin in the green compost cart when done.

Cooking oil from deep frying a Thanksgiving turkey is household hazardous waste (HHW). Look for the HHW button at www.RepublicServices.com/BeniciaCA to schedule a free appointment for disposal (non-business accounts only).

Be mindful—Eat or share all the holiday food you make. Compost food scraps from cooking, scrape plates into kitchen pail/compost cart after meals, and compost paper plates/napkins. Disposable (including compostable) utensils go in the trash.

Remove any batteries from holiday decorations and dispose of them properly. Locations to dispose of batteries: in a sealed plastic bag by your recycle cart (not in it), in containers (near restrooms) at Benicia Library, inside City Hall entrance, at Pedrotti Ace Hardware in the Southampton Shopping Center, or at City Corporation Yard's public HHW drop-off (2400 East 2nd St.) open Saturdays, 9 AM to noon.

Recycle your Christmas Tree Lights. Republic Services, in partnership with Museum of History Benicia (MoHB), located at 900 East 2nd St., will have containers for collecting strings of old Christmas tree lights at MoHB's Christmas tree lot. Watch for more information in the Sustainable Benician winter issue or visit mohbenicia.org. Light strings with large breakable bulbs will need bulbs removed.

Oil-based paints can now be dropped off at the City Corporation Yard's public household hazardous waste (HHW) drop-off, Saturdays, 9 AM to noon, 2400 East 2nd St., **starting October 1st**. Previously only latex paint was accepted. Oil base items include:

- Interior and exterior architectural paints: acrylic, alkyd, oil-based, enamel (including textured coatings)
- Deck coatings, floor paints (including elastomeric)
- Primers, sealers, under-coaters
- Stains, shellacs, lacquers, varnishes, urethanes (single component)
- Waterproofing concrete/masonry/wood sealers and repellents (not tar or bitumen-based)
- Metal coatings, rust preventatives
- Field and lawn paints.

This facility will also continue to accept light tubes, CFLs, household batteries, car batteries (No EV), motor oil and oil filters, antifreeze, latex paint, and aerosols. No charge to Benicia residents.

Other chemicals need an HHW Door-to-Door appointment for pickup. Look for the HHW button at RepublicServices.com/BeniciaCA to schedule a free appointment (non-business accounts only).
