Organics Recycling Update

California Senate Bill (SB) 1383 which was signed into law in 2016, establishes a goal of reducing the volume of organic waste disposed of in California landfills by 75% by 2025. SB 1383 builds on and expands the requirements of Assembly Bill (AB) 1826, which affects all businesses that generate 2 or more cubic yards of waste per week and multifamily properties with five or more units. Under SB 1383, all residential properties and all businesses, regardless of size, will be required to participate in organics recycling programs. At this time, there is no change to the current bin setup or waste disposal process for Placentia single-family residents. Please continue placing only yard waste in the organics container, as food waste is not yet accepted.

• Recycle all clean, dry paper in your recycling cart or dumpster. This includes cardboard and other boxes, envelopes, junk mail, magazines, newspaper, office paper, school papers, paperback books, paper grocery bags, shredded paper (bagged)

and wrapping paper with no metal. Also, recycle metal cans, glass bottles and jars, and plastic bottles, jugs and containers in the

- Reduce landscape debris by letting grass clippings drop back onto the lawn as you mow and composting in your backyard. In addition to landscape trimmings and leaves, you can also compost fruit and vegetable scraps. Compost helps create healthier soil that uses water more efficiently, leading to beautiful and productive gardens.
- Use your yard waste cart for limbs, branches, leaves, grass clippings, weeds, other plant material and small scrap wood (no painted or treated wood). Branches and wood must be no more than 4 inches in diameter and no more than 4 feet long. Palm fronds, cacti and other succulents, rocks, soil, pet waste, recyclables and trash are not accepted in the yard waste cart.

The City of Placentia and Republic Services continue to work on developing a new organics recycling program to meet the State requirements. Once a program is approved, further information will be provided to residents.

Commercial businesses generating 2 cubic yards or more of solid waste per week are required to divert organic materials. Please contact Republic Services to implement a food waste recycling program at 714.238.3300. Green waste should be back-hauled by landscapers or self-hauled to a composting facility. Documentation, such as receipts or weight tickets, is required as proof of diversion.

- Republic Services offers recycling service for cardboard and paper products. Alternatively, cardboard and other recyclables can be self-hauled to a participating recycling facility. Documentation is required for proof of diversion.
- The three-bin system requires businesses to have trash, recycling, and organics (yard trimmings, food, and food-soiled paper). For assistance on setting up a three-bin system, please contact Republic Services at 714.238.3300
- Provide education and information on how to properly sort and dispose of materials to employees, tenants, customers and contractors. Edible Food Recovery



To reduce food waste and help address food insecurity, Senate Bill (SB) 1383 requires that California recover or rescue 20% of surplus edible food to feed people in need by 2025. SB 1383 requires food-generating businesses to recover the maximum amount of their edible food that would otherwise go to landfills and to maintain records of their food donation activities. SB 1383 places mandated food donors into two tiers. Large food businesses, such as wholesale food vendors, distributors, food service providers and grocery stores, are required to have a food donation program in place. Additional businesses, such as cafeterias, restaurants and venues, are required to comply as well

Break Down Your Boxes

Please break down and flatten all cardboard and paperboard boxes. First, it will save a lot of room in your recycling cart. Second, it keeps items from getting caught inside the box. At the Materials Recovery Facility (MRF), staff members and machines work together to identify and sort materials as they travel rapidly over and through equipment. When other recyclables are inside boxes, they aren't visible and can't be separated by category, leading to contaminated bales of boxes and lost recyclable containers.



Customer Recycling Is Mandatory for Food Service Businesses

Under Assembly Bill (AB) 827, limited-service restaurants in California must provide customers with visible, clearly marked and easily accessible containers for recyclables and organics (uneaten food scraps, soiled paper and similar items) adjacent to trash bins. Limited-service restaurants include all food vendors who provide food for on-site consumption, including food courts, food trucks and restaurants where customers collect their own food and bus their tables. Full-service restaurants need to provide separate bins for



use by employees. You can download container and cabinet labels from **RecyclingSimplified.com/business-resources**.

Bulk Item Pickup in Placentia

The City of Placentia and Republic Services provide residents with a convenient pickup option for bulky items.

Single-Family Units: By appointment, Republic Services offers curbside pickup for large items. Placentia residents may request up to three bulky item pickups per calendar year at no charge. Each pickup is limited to 10 items. Additional bulky item pickups are



available throughout the year for a fee. To schedule this service, simply call Republic Services Customer Service at **714.238.3300** at least 48 hours before your regular collection day. Once your appointment is confirmed, a truck will be scheduled to collect your bulky items on your next regular collection day.

Multi-Family Units: Residents in multi-family communities should check with their homeowners association, property management, or property owner for specific instructions regarding bulky item disposal.

Recycling Requirement Reminder

In California, all residents and businesses are required by law to have a recycling program in place, including a designated recycling container. This State mandate is part of ongoing efforts to reduce waste and increase recycling, helping ensure that recyclable materials such as paper, glass, plastics and metals are properly sorted and processed.

Where Should Your Batteries Go?

Batteries make modern life possible. They power our phones, laptops, e-bikes, power tools, toys and even home backup systems. But behind their convenience lies a growing danger. When damaged or thrown away improperly, batteries can cause fires that are extremely difficult to control.

These fires are no longer rare. In fact, a collection truck fire occurred in Fountain Valley in December 2022 due to a discarded lithium-ion battery. Similar incidents have occurred across the country, leading to truck damage, facility shutdowns, injuries and service disruptions. Most of these fires happen when batteries are thrown into regular trash or recycling bins. Once compacted, punctured or exposed to heat during processing, they can ignite quickly.

Proper handling is the best defense. Unplug devices once fully charged to prevent overheating, and store batteries in a cool, dry place away from sharp or heavy items. Most importantly, never toss batteries in your curbside trash or recycling bin.

Instead, take advantage of local drop-off sites. Household battery recycling is free and easy at Orange County Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) Collection Centers, as well as at some local retail stores. For retail locations, visit Call2Recycle.org.

Before dropping off batteries, be sure to cover all 9-volt battery terminals with tape to prevent short circuits. Safe disposal protects your home, your community and the environment.

Picnic Without Plastic This Summer

In the warmer months, many families and friends head outdoors to enjoy picnics. While summer gatherings are a time to relax and connect, they can also lead to a surprising amount of waste, especially from single-use plastics. From utensils and straws, to food containers and plastic wrap, the convenience of disposable items often comes at the cost of long-term environmental harm. Fortunately, with just a bit of planning, it's easy to enjoy a picnic that's both fun and friendly to the environment.

Start by thinking about what you really need. Reusable picnicware like lightweight dishes, cups and silverware can be packed ahead of time and used again for future outings. Cloth napkins and washable food containers help cut down on trash and reduce your reliance on plastic wrap and bags. Many people already have these items at home, and simply bringing them along can make a big difference.

Food and drink choices matter too. Buying in bulk and packing snacks or meals into reusable containers helps eliminate excess packaging. Instead of bottled water or juice boxes, refillable bottles keep drinks cold and waste low. Even simple changes, like skipping



the pre-packaged fruit and slicing your own at home, reduce plastic waste without adding much effort.

If your picnic includes grilling or takeout, consider bringing your own reusable takeout kit. This could include containers, a few serving tools and a small cooler to carry leftovers back home. Leftovers packed this way tend to stay fresher and are less likely to be forgotten or wasted. A plastic-free picnic doesn't mean giving up convenience or enjoyment.

Eco Lessons for Children

Reading with your children can be a wonderful way to bond and learn together. The following books and magazine not only provide engaging stories, but they also offer valuable lessons on recycling, environmental stewardship, and the power of individual actions. These works can spark meaningful conversations and inspire both children and adults to take better care of our planet.



One Kid's Trash by Jamie Sumner - Jamie Sumner's One Kid's Trash explores the life of Hugo, a boy struggling to find his place in a new school. Through his unique ability to sort and recycle trash, Hugo gains acceptance and discovers that his peculiar talent is his strength. The narrative beautifully combines humor and heart, making it an engaging read that encourages children to embrace their differences and consider the importance of recycling.

Total Garbage by Rebecca Donnelly - Rebecca Donnelly's Total Garbage follows Georgie, a young girl with an unusual fascination for trash. The story creatively highlights the potential of recycling and repurposing waste materials. Georgie's adventures offer a captivating way for children to understand environmental responsibility and the value of innovation. The book's playful tone makes complex ideas about waste management accessible to young readers.

This Class Can Save the Planet by Stacy Tornio - This Class Can Save the Planet by Stacy Tornio tells the inspiring story of a class that takes environmental action seriously. Properly Dispose of Household Hazardous Waste

Household hazardous waste (HHW) is any product in your home that could be poisonous or dangerous if thrown into the trash. HHW includes car and lawn care products, paints and paint thinners, cleaning supplies and more. Never toss HHW into the trash. HHW can endanger children or pets, result in spills in your neighborhood, or cause fires if it is placed into curbside carts.

Dispose of HHW at no charge Tuesday through Saturday, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., at one of the four Orange County HHW Collection Centers. (Please note, they are closed on major holidays and on rainy days.) You can also dispose of batteries and old electronic devices at these centers. The nearest location for Placentia residents



is 1071 N. Blue Gum St., Anaheim, 92806. For a list of accepted materials or more information, visit **OClandfills.com/hazardous**.

Medication Disposal

Unused or expired medications left in your home can lead to accidental poisoning or allow access for misuse of the medications. Many local drugstores accept medications for proper disposal. You can quickly search online for "medication disposal near me" to locate permanent disposal locations nearby. 


Compost Giveaway Recap

On February 1, 2025, from 7 a.m. to 11 a.m., the City hosted a compost giveaway event at 2301 N. Kraemer Blvd. in Placentia. This early morning community event drew 700 residents from the surrounding area to Tri-City Park. The event featured the distribution of 20 tons of loose compost, which was made available to attendees on a first-come, first-served basis. A single 40-yard roll-off container was used to transport and store the compost on-site. To ensure the process ran smoothly, eight temporary employees were present throughout the morning. Staff members assisted with both the distribution of compost and provided loading support for residents who brought their own containers.







Contamination Monitoring

In accordance with state law, Republic Services staff will be conducting annual contamination monitoring reviews. Representatives, in clearly identified safety vests, will be in the community reviewing the contents of organics, recycling and trash carts and dumpsters. If contamination is found, a tag will be placed on the cart or dumpster identifying the incorrect items. Please note that these reviews are mandated by state law and will occur on an annual basis.
