You don't have to get on the phone to contact Customer Service. Use the Republic Services app to schedule a special pickup or report a missed pickup. Commercial Diversion Requirements for Customers

DENSELY POPULATED AREAS

- ▶ **Meet the minimum diversion service level ratio of 35%.** This means at least 35% of the weekly container capacity must be available for recyclables and organic materials.
- ▶ Divert food waste, as well as green waste, either in an organics bin or in a dedicated food waste collection bin.

SPARSELY POPULATED AREAS

- ▶ Customers that generate 2 cubic yards per week or more of total recyclable materials, solid waste and organic materials have food waste collection services available through Republic Services.
- ▶ To see the type of area your business is in, check on the County's website under the Solid Waste Ordinance Update.

Construction and Demolition (C&D) Recycling

C&D projects must divert their waste from landfill disposal in the County of San Diego. Republic Services offers C&D collection service for projects that generate C&D material.

Interested in food-waste-only service?

Contact your account manager for a quote. With this option, you can place clean food waste in clear plastic bags for easy disposal.

Holidays

Republic Services observes the following holidays:

▶ New Year's Day	▶ Labor Day
▶ Memorial Day	▶ Thanksgiving Day
▶ Independence Day	▶ Christmas Day

If your service day falls on or after one of these holidays, it will be delayed by one day. For all other holidays, your service day will remain the same.

Technical Assistance

Placing Containers for Collection

DUMPSTERS/BINS/ROLL-OFFS

Do not block access for the driver. If the dumpster is inside a dedicated room or enclosure, allow access for the driver, or have a dedicated person on-site move the dumpster to an accessible location for the driver.

CARTS

- ▶ Face carts toward the street with wheels against the curb or gutter the night before or by 7 a.m. on your scheduled service day.
- ▶ Allow at least 3 feet between carts and 6 feet between carts and other objects.
- ▶ Make sure lids are securely shut.

Avoid Contamination and Overages

Keep containers free of contamination, and make sure lids close

Did you know trash can contaminate your recycling or organics?

By eliminating materials that don't belong, you help ensure recyclables and organic materials are properly handled and processed. If a recycling load contains trash or non-recyclables, the load may no longer be recycled. Similarly, trash or recycling in organics containers may lead to the load being disposed of as trash. Even trash can become contaminated if hazardous materials are placed inside the container.

Is there a fee for contamination?

Contaminated bins may incur contamination fees.

Is there a fee for overloaded containers?

Yes, there is a charge per occurrence. Ensuring you have correct service levels is more cost-effective than overloading a smaller container or not having the correct frequency of service.

What is an overloaded container?

Typically, if the lids do not sit flat on the container, it is considered overloaded. Overloaded containers happen when more material is loaded in the container than it can handle.

Why is an overloaded container an issue?

Overloaded containers often result in materials not making their way into the truck upon tipping. Materials on the top of the container will often end up on the ground.

Is there a fee for overloaded containers?

Yes, there is a charge per occurrence. Ensuring you have correct service levels is more cost-effective than overloading a smaller container or not having the correct frequency of service.

HOW TO AVOID OVERLOADS

- ▶ Ensure you have the right service for your needs.
- ▶ Increase diversion methods.
- ▶ Ask your local team for a waste audit to "right-size" your services.
- ▶ Locking devices are available for dumpster service, for a fee.
