

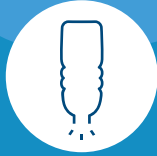
Keep recycling clean, loose, or in clear bags only.

Business Recycling Laws

Mandatory Commercial Recycling

State law, AB 341, requires businesses generating 4 cubic yards or more of trash per week to have a recycling program. For more information, visit: calrecycle.ca.gov/recycle/commercial.

Mandatory Recycling and Organics Containers

State law, AB 827, requires businesses (covered under AB 341 and AB 1826) to have organics and recycling containers available for customers to use to collect material purchased and consumed on their premises. Senate Bill 1383

Composting organics is now law! Organic material accounts for more than one-third of the waste stream in California. Greenhouse gas emissions caused by the decomposition of organic material in landfills, contribute to global climate change. Businesses are required to separate organics, including all food scraps, uncoated food-soiled paper and yard trimmings for composting. For more information, go to calrecycle.ca.gov/organics/slcp.

Food Recovery

To reduce food waste and help address food insecurity, SB 1383 requires that by 2025 California will recover 20 percent of edible food that would otherwise be sent to landfills, to feed people in need. The law directs the following:

- Jurisdictions must establish food recovery programs and strengthen their existing food recovery networks
- Food donors must arrange to recover the maximum amount of their edible food that would otherwise go to landfills
- Food recovery organizations and services that participate in SB 1383 must maintain records

Landfill
