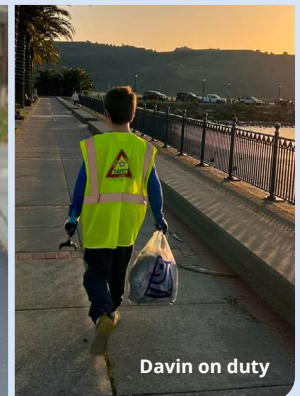

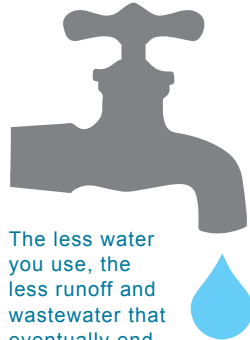

Great job, Scouts!

Thank you for recycling your Christmas Trees and expired tree lights. The Scouts chipped **705 trees**. With an average of **21,137 lbs.** per tree, the total average weight collected was over **14,902 lbs.** or close to **7.5 tons**. Republic Services collected expired tree lights at the Museum of History, Benicia tree lot and 80 lbs. of lights were diverted from the landfill.



Fighting Plastic Waste

Effective January 1, 2026, California's Senate Bill 1053 **bans all plastic carryout bags**, including "thick" reusable plastic bags, at grocery stores, retail pharmacies, and convenience stores. Stores may only provide recycled paper bags for a minimum 10-cent fee, marking a major effort to reduce single-use plastic waste.

Ordering food delivered or picking up a quick meal? If you are taking it home, remember to tell the restaurant to **NOT GIVE YOU SINGLE-USE PLASTIC UTENSILS**. **Single-use plastic utensil bans and only offered "by request" laws are increasing to combat plastic pollution.** California (AB 1276) began in 2022 and mandates that utensils, straws, and condiments only be provided upon request.
