Ever wondered if you could get local food direct from local farms, right here in Benicia? Good news—you can! Join Stephanie Jordan, Local Food Program Manager at Sustainable Solano, for an evening learning about Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) and how you can get fresh produce, fish, meat, eggs (and more) for you and your family each week. Stephanie will give a brief tour and overview of Benicia's CSA site, discuss the economic and environmental impacts of buying local, and then showcase that week's produce in a cooking demonstration and tasting.

Thank you for recycling your holiday lights and trees.

Republic Services collected 65 lbs. of expired holiday lights at the Museum of History's (MoHB) tree lot sale.

Benicia's Cub Scouts, Scouts BSA, and Venture Crew collected 922 trees for the 2024/2025 season. This equates to an average weight of 19,490 lbs. of greenwaste recycled. The trees are chipped for ground cover on City of Benicia properties. This number does not include flocked trees which have to be disposed of in the landfill.

The Benicia Scouts Christmas Tree Recycling Project enables scouts and leaders to work directly with the community using a 'conservation minded' approach. The Scouts also volunteered to help neighbors in need. For 2024, over 50 Benicia Scouts earned a combined amount of over 500 conservation service hours collecting trees and helping neighbors. The program is funded by Republic Services along with in-kind donations from local businesses.
