Share More, Waste Less with Deschutes Public Libraries

Waste prevention isn't just about what you throw away - it's about what you choose not to buy in the first place. Deschutes Public Library gives you tools to share items, reuse materials, and save money.

Use your library card to unlock dozens of free digital resources. Check out the Library of Things program that allows you to borrow items that you may only use once or twice. The collection of items includes musical instruments, kitchen appliances and outdoor gear encouraging "trying before buying".

Trash Collection Guide

We provide weekly curbside collection of trash, with different cart sizes to meet your needs. Please have carts out the night before or by 5 a.m. on your collection day, as route times may vary.

Bag household trash before placing in the trash cart. Place carts in the street by the curb with the lid opening toward the street. Allow at least 4 ft. of clear space on either side of the cart for truck access. Please do not block sidewalks or bike lanes.

The following materials are NOT accepted in your trash cart: hazardous materials, sharps/needles, hot ashes, electronics, dirt/rocks and concrete. For information on household hazardous waste collection, visit Deschutescounty.gov/solidwaste.

Recycle Right: Know Where Your Recycling Goes

Recycling conserves energy and natural resources and helps reduce waste in landfills. Separating out recyclable materials might also save money on the trash bill.

Ever wonder where your recycling goes after you place your cart at the curb? See how it all comes together in Deschutes County in a short video at Deschutescounty.gov/recycle. You can also find resources like recycling guides, household hazardous waste collection days and additional materials accepted for drop-off at Negus Transfer Station.



Recycling Tip: Always place recyclables loose in the recycling cart. Never place materials in a bag. Plastic bags jam equipment and degrade the value of other materials.

Other common contaminants to keep out of the recycling include Styrofoam™ and other foam packaging, hoses, wires, food, liquid and batteries. Batteries must be recycled separately, as they can cause fires. Batteries can be dropped off at no charge at Negus Transfer Station in Redmond.

Waste prevention starts before anything reaches a bin. The stuff we buy is one of the biggest drivers of climate change: making, shipping, using, and tossing goods accounts for 70% of global greenhouse gas emissions.¹ Using less stuff is good for people and the planet. Let's rethink waste together!

Reduce

The best way to prevent waste is to not create it. We simply can't recycle our way out of the plastic problem. Glass and aluminum can be recycled endlessly, but plastic is only recycled a few times before it's landfilled.²

BORROW INSTEAD OF BUY: Check out tools, kitchen equipment, gear, and more from local resources like the Deschutes Public Library's Library of Things, Central Oregon Tool Library and DIY Cave.

BUY IN BULK AND BRING YOUR OWN CONTAINERS: Fill small containers with just what you need. Less packaging, less waste, and less money spent! Central Oregon Locavore, Local Acres Market, the Pantry, and Cornucopia Natural Foods are a few local options with bulk sections.

CONSOLIDATE ONLINE ORDERS and select slower shipping to reduce packaging waste and carbon emissions. Better yet, shop local.

In the US, 38% of the food we grow and buy is never eaten—wasting money and resources.³ Preventing food waste is a powerful climate solution—even more than composting alone.⁴

LOVE FOOD, NOT WASTE: Take the Rethink Waste Food Waste Challenge to learn what's going to waste in your home and practice strategies to waste less. Support food rescue like HDFFA's Grow & Give program, which redirects excess fresh produce to Central Oregonians experiencing food insecurity.

ON THE GO: Bring your own mug, water bottle, and food containers. Oregon law now allows restaurants to fill your clean reusable containers for takeout and leftovers!

Reusables beat disposables. Reusable containers skip the PFAS “forever chemicals” coating many disposables that are linked to health and environmental risks.⁵ Plus, a reusable cup can have up to one-tenth the climate impact of a disposable one.⁶

FOR YOUR NEXT PARTY OR EVENT:

Check out reusable dishware from The Environmental Center and partners.

AT HOME: Use reusable cloth napkins to replace paper towels and napkins.

DONATE WORKING ITEMS and shop second-hand first through thrift stores, buy-nothing groups on Facebook, and the Porch Swing app available in Bend.
